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Dear sponsors, financial adopters, donors, volunteers and interested parties.

When I started the project to help underprivileged children in Central Sulawesi in 2009, I did not think that something so beautiful and successful would be realized. In these years we have already cared for, raised and trained sixty children through our (3) objectives. Eight children have already graduated for their university or academic studies. It all seems like a fairytale, but is that true?

For most children it is indeed a fairy tale because we have laid the foundation for a promising and happy life for them. Behind the scenes, however, there are also many low points that undermine our mission and sometimes have a major impact on the board, management and staff. We regularly encounter cases of corruption, unethical conduct, fraud, abuse of trust and forgery. The fairy tale then turns into a nightmare for the management team, which causes a lot of stress.

In particular, a major conflict with our neighbors at Resort Dolidi Ndano is now happening again, but it is still too early to fully inform you about this. I am writing this to you because in this newsletter you can read about a number of matters that relate to this and may raise questions.

We try to keep the children aloof from these problems as much as possible. I discuss all cases intensively with the management team and discuss our views with the staff. So, I'm not alone! Dodi in particular is a great support to me. A literal and figurative feeling of emptiness has arisen in me due to Esther's death. I discussed these problems with her and we as a team always found a solution. I still have to overcome this emptiness. That will work because the children are my inspiration and motivation to continue unabated!

My story is something I wanted to share with you and I hope I can tell more in the next regular newsletter or if necessary, in an extra edition.

Remains, also on behalf of the board to thank you all again for your support!





Tasva

Interim financial report of Astin

With still 3 months to go, it is expected that our expenses in 2023 will be +/- € 6,000 higher than budgeted. The cause is higher unforeseen expenses due to hospital admissions by Utin and Tabitha in Makassar, higher personnel costs and damage to equipment due to overvoltage in the electricity grid. At the end of the year (if no additional donations are received) there may be a deficit in the balance of € 3,700. This amount can then be covered from our liquid assets.









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Expansion of sports facilities

We pay a lot of attention to the physical education of our children. Sports are healthy for the body and mind and that is why we motivate the children to exercise more. To this end, we have constructed 2 additional sports facilities again this year. In addition to our existing volleyball, takraw (traditional foot volleyball) and badminton fields, we have also constructed a beach football field and a basketball court. The football field is fenced and can also be used for other sports and games events. The staff also participates regularly, which is good for harmonious relationships.





New accommodation for our guests

Due to the ongoing conflict with our neighbors, we are no longer able or willing to book a room at the resort for our family, friends and loyal sponsors. That is why we have built a fully by Opa sponsored accommodation at the shelter exclusively for these visitors. If these people want to visit us, we invite them to stay at the project for free as our guests if there is a room available. We can receive a maximum of 6 people. The stay is free because we are not allowed to do commercial activities due to the ANBI status and the protocols in Indonesia. We have now received our first (sponsor) guests in August. The Charlotte and Martijn Moerman family from Amsterdam stayed with us for a week as part of their Sulawesi tour. They were very enthusiastic about their stay and about our approach to educating underprivileged children and giving them a chance for a good future. It was also wonderful and heart-warming for us to see that their children, Julius and Isabel, spent a lot of time in good harmony with our children and therefore developed a good bond.

The celebration of our annual birthday day for the children is basically on August 17 because this is Grandpa's birthday and all children are free from school due to the celebration of independence in Indonesia. The day is always completely filled with activities; Eating cake, exchanging gift surprises, playing competition 6 camp, catering and a party evening with live music are regular items. Electricity problems

Ever since the shelter opened, we have had to deal with power outages almost every day, sometimes several times a day. In addition to the many cable disruptions, the Electricity Company PLN is unable to report planned work to us. In principle it is not a big problem because we have a good generator as a backup that takes over the power supply. However, at the end of September we were surprised by an overvoltage from the grid, most likely caused by an incorrect circuit during work. We had not turned on the generator at that time and were still connected to the grid. The overvoltage was so high that the meter exploded and our devices, which were connected to the grid at the time, broke due to burning of the PCBs. The total damage is approximately €800 for material and immaterial costs. Now we cannot insure ourselves against this and are trying to recover the costs from PLN. Given the previous conflicts we have had with PLN, we do not expect much from this. Below is part of our report with the costs that we are trying to claim from PLN in this way. To prevent this problem in the future, we have ordered overvoltage protection.





Study fund





Passed!

Utin successfully completed her accountancy studies with the thesis (final) exam in June. She scored an excellent 3.89 out of 4. However, her graduation, which was planned for December, will have to wait a little longer and is now provisionally scheduled for the spring of 2024. Utin has not been idle after completing her studies. To quickly find a good job, she took additional competency-oriented training in business administration and management. She also passed that. Opa then invited Utin to come home for a holiday and to work on her future plans. After 2 weeks she came to Opa with a proposal. She wanted to return to Makassar to look for (temporary) work there until her graduation and in this way to contribute to her living costs, which will be borne by the foundation until graduation. That is a mentality that guarantees a good future! That is why Opa approached a good relationship at a large hotel chain (Melia Hotels) in Makassar who would like to help her further. She will start an internship there on November 1, to teach her how to work in the real job. She may be able to be hired for a permanent job that will complement her studies before her graduation. Melia has many hotels in Asia and that offers many opportunities because Utin is also flexible in the place of employment.









Final stages of study in China

Agnes is in her last semester of medical school in China. The study results are great and her assessment is regularly "exelent". Her graduation is provisionally scheduled for the end of June 2024. This does not mean that she is ready for her goal of practicing as a pediatrician in Indonesia. She will have to extend her studies in Indonesia by 1 or a maximum of 2 years to achieve this. Since June 2023, Agnes has been doing an internship at the "Second Affiated Hospital in Xinxiang City" in the Department of Neurology. Because the travel distance from campus to the hospital is too long, she moved to an apartment near the hospital. Agnes is now in her final phase at the Neurosurgery department, of which some photos.

Hospitalization Utin

Utin became very ill at the end of June and had to be admitted to the Siloam hospital in Makassar for treatment with a high fever. The diagnosis was Dengue fever, a (life) dangerous viral infectious disease. This virus is transmitted by the bite of the tiger mosquito. Fortunately, the first Denque vaccine has recently come onto the market for treatment (Qdenga). Utin was vaccinated and was able to leave the hospital after a week's stay. She has now fully recovered and is doing well again.

The costs for her treatment and medicines are $\in 1,900$.





About Denque in Sulawesi. The chance of contracting a Dengue infection on Sulawesi is not very high. The most common known occurrence is during the rainy season at sea level. We have no known cases in the mountains of central Sulawesi. The Dengue vaccine Qdenga is recommended for travelers aged four years and older who had a dengue infection more than 1 year ago and travel to an endemic country for more than 4 weeks and/or on a high frequency.



Hospitalization Tabitha

Tabitha contracted an intestinal infection in September and spent 4 days in Siloam hospital for treatment. Tabitha has also fully recovered from her illness.

The costs for her treatment and medicines are €700.

It is not possible for the foundation to insure our children as a group (at a discount). The costs of taking out good insurance individually for each child are far too high.
